



## Robert L. Cornali

April 3, 1942 - March 10, 2026

Robert L. Cornali, 83, of North Huntingdon, died March 10, 2026. He was born April 3, 1942, the son of the late Arthur and Lucille (Vucelich) Cornali, of White Valley. He graduated from Clarion University in 1964, having been a proud member of the Alpha Gamma Phi fraternity and establishing lifelong friends in the Clarion area. He was affectionately known by these friends as “Jumbo.” He continued his fraternity with his Gamma brothers and friends throughout his life meeting yearly to hunt, play golf, attend Clarion homecoming, and perform philanthropy work for the university.

He met his beloved wife, Pam, while working his way through college, as a starter at Westmoreland Country Club. Pam was a waitress at the club, and he often told the story of working to win her heart. His lifetime love of golf was also fostered along with wonderful lifelong friendships with many of the club members and their families.

He spent 35 years teaching U.S. History and Contemporary Affairs at Norwin Senior High School, retiring in 2000. His interest in international affairs spurred his involvement with the World Affairs Council, leading discussions at the World Affairs Institute and, as the President of Norwin’s AFS student exchange chapter, welcoming students from across the world to the U.S. Later in life he and Pam had much joy traveling to visit with his former AFS students across Europe.

Perhaps one of his favorite activities, besides succeeding in scoring his age in golf, was to be outdoors working in his garden and with the soil. He loved to

share the work of his labors providing vegetables or cooking them for his friends and family.

Robert is survived by his wife, Pamela A. (Kubjalko) Cornali; his children Brian Cornali and wife Amy (Kovach), of Hickory, Benjamin Cornali of Cranberry, and David Cornali and wife Cyndi (Lappe), of North Huntingdon; four grandchildren, Shane, Brooke, Morgan and Luke; his brother Bernard and wife Beth Cornali, of White Valley; his sister Roberta Fix, of Murrysville; and his sister-in-law Barbara (Supancic) Cornali of Greensburg; and many nieces and nephews. He is preceded in death by his parents as well as his beloved brother Bart C. Cornali of Greensburg.

“ I would like to honor the memory of Mr. Cornali, who meant so much to me during one of the most formative years of my life when I was a foreign exchange student in Pittsburgh all the way from Sweden.

*To his students, including me, he was far more than a teacher. He was a mentor, a guide, and someone who truly cared about the people sitting in his classroom. His passion for history and the world around us inspired generations of students to think critically and to care about the future.*

*I had the privilege of knowing Mr. Cornali during the 1987–1988 school year when I was an exchange student in the United States. He was my AFS contact at the school, and from the very beginning he welcomed me with warmth, kindness, and genuine curiosity about where I came from. What began as a teacher-student relationship soon became something much deeper. We became very close, and he made me feel like part of his extended family.*

*Through him, I got to know his family, who were always just as welcoming and generous. Even long after my exchange year ended, Mr. Cornali continued to open his home to me whenever I returned to visit. His hospitality never changed, and neither did his interest in how my life was unfolding back in Sweden.*

*One of the things I cherish most is that he had the chance to meet my parents when they visited from Sweden. I always hoped he would one day visit me there as well, and I deeply regret that it never happened. Still, our friendship crossed the ocean in spirit.*

*I remember one time when I returned to the United States with my then boyfriend, Mr. Cornali spent time with us and even played golf with him—just one more example of the easy warmth and generosity that defined him. He had a way of making people feel welcome and valued, no matter where they came from.*

*Even though it has been some years since I last saw him, his influence and kindness have never faded. I will miss him deeply. The world truly feels different without him in it.*

*The sign he had in his classroom that read: "You can't hug a child with nuclear arms." captured something essential about him—his belief in humanity, compassion, and the power of understanding over conflict.*

*Mr. Cornali was a remarkable teacher, a generous host, and a kind soul who left a lasting mark on the lives of so many. I will always be grateful to have known him.*
